

Throughout Lent we have continued to pray for peace and stability in Ukraine, the recent year's anniversary of the invasion marked so powerfully with our community observing a minute's silence before Year 7 Mariia sang a ballad from the St Anne Line mound. Fr Paul of The Blessed Sacrament led prayers, and Chelmsford MP Vicky Ford attended to pay her personal observance, afterwards meeting with a number of our Ukrainian & Afghan students to learn about their experiences since joining us.

The recent focus in the public arena on national policy concerning those seeking sanctuary and safety provides pause for reflection. We are reminded of Joseph & Mary's flight. They and Christ were refugees, migrants fleeing persecution, seeking warmth and security in troubled times. Whatever the complexity and nuance of the situation, we must always witness our common identity as people of God, responding with humanity, compassion and love.

Our Lenten reflections have encompassed Retreats for Year 8, school representation at Flame Congress at Wembley's Ovo Arena, and Reconciliation in school for upwards of four hundred students. Last night's Lent service was a moving testament to our faith, and it has been nice to gather in witness with the students as each Year group has attended the service today.




Today's non-uniform day is in aid of CAFOD, with 25% of donations to initiatives inspired by our student Earth Society to support our stewardship of the environment, a newly introduced means being to plant six tress per year - one for each new Year 7 Form. Older students from each House will plant the trees as a welcome gift that will grow with the younger children as they progress throughout their time with us.

The term has as ever been full, with students attending a swimming gala at the Olympic park aquatics centre, team and individual sporting success, Head Boy Onyeka continuing his progress in athletics, the visit of over 200 Year 5 children from our Catholic feeder schools, a fantastic collaboration with Chelmer Valley in the monologue & duologue slam, N-Act Theatre Company performing a drama on mental health to Year 9, Frantic Assembly drama workshops, a Sports Readers' trip to Chelmsford Library, an A Level English Language visit to a London conference, the Year 9 Respect project, and visits of councillors from across the political spectrum to speak to our Government & Politics students. ### **Flame 2023**



We started the day early, meeting at New Hall School along with many from our diocese. The coaches arrived and, with almost one hundred buzzing young Christians we set off for 'Flame 2023'.

After an hour and a half, we arrived at Wembley Arena and were greeted by what seemed like millions of young people all flocking towards the big arena. We headed in and found our seats. I was in Block D1 Row 11 Seat 3. Whilst it was near the back of the arena, I still felt part of the atmosphere amongst all 8,000 of us that had come to bear witness.

The event began with the music group 'One Hope Project', opening the show with two songs which included a personal favourite of mine: '10,000 Reasons (Bless the Lord).' The uplifting lyrics definitely set the mood for the day. Afterwards, our hosts were introduced, one of which was former St John Payne Head Boy, Father Michael. We were uproarious and so proud to see one of our own representing us on stage.

This year was dedicated to Father Dermott Donnelly; the founder of 'Flame'. The last name sounded incredibly familiar but I never expected where I recognised it from until Father Michael introduced someone who was the able to tell us more about Father Dermott. We were greeted by a broadcast from Ant & Dec. I didn't realise until then that Father Dermott was Dec's late brother.

Soon David Wells began to interview Robert Billott - a Catholic environmental lawyer from America who fought against a chemical company that was harming people and animals with their products. The result is Billott getting his own movie: 'Dark Waters' starring Mark Ruffalo and Anne Hathaway; the Hulk and Catwoman!

Then we had our first break during which my friend Evelyn and I decided to take part in the diocese selfie competition! This involved us having to go around taking selfies and talking to different people such as nuns, priests, our own doppelgängers and people who had travelled more than five hours to get there. The most challenging by far was to get a selfie with a musician and a speaker at the event. We tried to get backstage but our break was over and we didn't make it. The rest of the challenge would have to wait until later....

After the break we were greeted by a South American Catholic. We heard her inspiring story of the work she has done to preserve the Amazon and teach the young in her community. Next to take to the stage was MOBO award-winning 'Guvna B'. We started screaming and raved to some Catholic rap music. Then he initiated a competition. He told us about his Ghanaian roots and about how when praying they would wave a random object in the air and challenged us to do the same in order to win an album. I very cleverly began to wave my Toshiba laptop in an attempt to gain his attention. Unfortunately, I was robbed of victory and a lucky Adidas shoe owner was victorious!

The second third ended with Adenike who led us in an 8000-person choir. She was amazing and shared her testimony with us.

During the next break, we were determined to do everything we could to win the diocese selfie challenge. All was going well until we got to our final obstacle: the backstage security guard. We used every single persuasive device our English teachers had ever taught us and soon we were in! We were absolutely buzzing as we headed straight to Adenike and her sequined jacket. She was lovely and told us about how she was very good at taekwondo. We took a selfie and moved on.

Next we met David Wells - we spoke briefly to him and then we took a selfie and went away. We couldn't believe that we had actually pulled it off!

We were so happy as the third act started with the amazing 'Faith Child'. As expected, 'Faith Child' brought loads of energy to the stage and blessed us with his amazing rap music and talent. Soon we had a calmer section of the day when priests and cardinals were to bless us and spread a message of hope. My favourite was Cardinal Tagle who is a Filipino priest who first came to Flame in 2015. He spread a message of hope and encouraged us to 'rise up'. He also shared his memories of his dearly departed friend father Dermot.

Finally came adoration. Adoration was definitely a stand out from our trip. 8000 people were gathered together and we still managed to find silence. They sang a refrain that we frequently sing at school during Mass: 'Be still in the presence of the Lord'. It was awe-inspiring as Adenike led us in worship. Every performer that day came on the stage and was exactly as the song suggests--still. Our host concluded the day and just as quickly as it started Flame 2023 was over.

The experience and blessings I received on that day will stay with me forever and it was definitely a time to remember. I look forward to going again. Just as they quickly buzzed in, what seemed like millions of Christians, quickly buzzed out leaving with feelings of peace and joy and filled with the presence of God.



### Inclusivity at SJP by Mila S 12D



February 24th marked a full year since the Russian invasion of Ukraine. Within school we were blessed to have Maria Yakymchuk, a year seven student and Ukrainian refugee, sing in remembrance of her country, of the lives lost, the homes destroyed, and the hearts broken. We were also visited by Vicky Ford, the local member of parliament, who spoke to both the Ukrainian and Afghan refugee students that we have within our school. As she spoke to them, she, as all who were in the room, saw the prevalent strength of each child, with appreciation of not only where they were, but where there had come from and what had been left behind.

There are over twenty refugee students contributing to the St John Payne school community. Each one speaking in a language that is not their own, each one leaving a home and family behind, each one still growing up. When speaking to them, their astounding maturity and manners mask the fact that they are all still children and teenagers at most. Yet, they have been through experiences, dealt with burdens, and learnt lessons that should never have to be taught to such ages.

When speaking to them individually the confluence of their age and their experience met, becoming very apparent. Like most, they still feel the stresses of lessons, tests and teachers they don't like. They watch the newest shows on Netflix and scroll through tik-tok. They love dancing and singing. They have dreams and aspirations. Just like any other person their age. However, in stark divergence they feel the stresses of their family's safety, and the separation from those they love. They watch as their homes are destroyed. They love with hearts that have experienced so much loss. They dream and aspire, working with double the load of the schoolwork they experience during the day, the work at night in order to stay on top of the education of their home country, and still tackling the daily struggle of learning a new language, which for many is their third, fourth, fifth or even further, language learnt. However, despite these challenges, when given the opportunity to drop subjects, they self-advocate to continue in the same level of education as their peers, seeing the benefit that each class has on them. Very different from others their age.

Each student spoken to shared both a humble frustration yet fierce humility of life and school in this country, foreign to them. They reminisced fondly of the peers and schools that they had left at home, the clubs and hobbies they had had to leave behind and the grandma that they call daily yet still wish to hug. However, they also communicated an overwhelming gratitude for what this school has given them. Gaining new friends and finding sanctity in the friends that arrived with them, learning new things and feeling the place they have as a member of this community.

In many ways, what they have been through will unfortunately never be fully appreciated. However, their space, place and importance within this school will forever be seen and valued.

When speaking with the students on the 24th of February, Ford spoke of the country standing together, standing with and standing against

# Olympic sprinter Adam inspires students during visit to school

BEGINNING in December 2022, the St John Payne Catholic School in Chelmsford launched a new initiative, manufactured and facilitated by teachers within the school, called Sports Readers.

The programme was originally orchestrated with the aim of helping younger secondary school students with low reading ages improve their reading and comprehension abilities in order to ensure that they were equipped with the necessary skills to support them as they continue through their school career, using sports and athletic reward as a moti-

The importance of reading has become significantly more crucial for students' success across all areas of education as exam questions within almost all subjects have become increasingly more wordbased and require an added level of understanding of what the question really requires.

Although it is understood that encouraging students to read twice a week will not ignite a love for literature amongst them all, there is no doubt about the impact that this will have on their school careers and further outcomes.

This programme began as a hope for academic growth and has, due to its noble cause, caught the attention of several people eager to share and support the students in their efforts.

Only recently the school, in Patching Hall Lane, was honoured to be visited by Adam Gemili, three-time European champion and Olympian.

The British sprinter was the 2014 European champion at 200 metres. three-time European champion in the 4 x 100 metres relay, and part of the Great Britain team that won gold at the 2017 World Championships in the same event. He has finished fourth in the 200 metres at the 2016 Rio Olympic Games, and fourth and fifth in separate editions of the World. Championships in the same event.

Arriving early in the morning, he was able to watch the students at work within the programme, fuelled by hot chocolate and pastries, reading together.

Afterwards he spoke to the group, allowing time for open discussion and questions from the students





and, for the emainder of the morneral other ing, he worked wit pupils who share his nunning

Going through drills with them, giving them their very own training session from an Olympic athlete, the students were given an opportunity they most likely will never forget.

Adam's personable character and genuine interest in the students made him very easy for them to connect to, seeing him not as a distant role model with shoes impossible to fill, but as a peer with opportunities received through passion and hard

They were shown that if they dedicate the necessary effort, they also have the ability

Illustrating the journey he went through in order to reach where he has, Adam emphasised the importance of hard work, perseverance

Speaking openly about his regrets, achievements, failures and successes, his vulnerability made him all the easier for the students to connect with.

St John Payne's own athletes, one being Onyeka Okoh, who only recently attended an under-20s international competition Madrid, all benefitted from Adam's visit, seeing a reflection of who they are striving to become.

It is the qualities that he discussed that the Sports Reader's programme also advocates and strives to build within the youth of today, making Adam not only a role model for the athletics students at the school but also to all who he met during his

The finalist is due to be announced shortly.




### Mathematics Spring Newsletter

#### Inter-House Maths Competition by Mr Newman



Connie Ashton-Tyler's display on Women in Mathematics was difficult to match and so, with two other excellent entries from 7A, first place went to Augustinians.



### **Auschwitz project**



On the 1st of March, we both got the honourable opportunity to travel to Poland and visit the Auschwitz Museum and Memorial with the Lessons from Auschwitz project. This project, set up by the Holocaust Educational Trust, is an eye-opening experience that aims to teach young people about the Holocaust and it's relevance today in a profound way to reveal what can occur if prejudice and racism become tolerable. From taking in all the overwhelmingly humbling sights and shocking information to feeling a sense of pride in being able to bear witness to victims, this project is truly vital to anyone who wants to educate themselves and others. The project undoubtably achieved its aim, as we bore witness to all those effected, through the reflection on the vast number of names written in the book of victims, the harrowing sight of their belongings, and the beautiful memorial service to pay respect. Our group leader Jamie was trustworthy and passionate-allowing us to truly understand the depth of the information given, not just as statistics, but the life experiences of actual people.

I am honoured to have been a part of this amazing experience- it has shaped my view of the world and given me the confidence to share this with others. Being able to indulge in the sights of the significant village of Oswiecim, and the Auschwitz 1 and Birkenau camps opened my eyes and brought the victims lives closer- not just as a topic in history but as the genocide that left children without parents and parents without children.

The book containing the names of the victims in Auschwitz 1 was a shocking sight that is still incomprehensible to me. It revealed the enormous size of the scar left on the Jewish nation, made so hurtfully blatant through the 4 million names written on massive pages in tiny font- spanning the entire length of the room. This book of names told me more than any history textbook- proving that this experience has enriched my knowledge and compassion further than the classroom. The ability to learn about life before Nazi rule, life

in the camp and how survivors survived is something you cannot read about in a textbook- that's why this experience was so unique and eye-opening. As the project highlights, and I experienced, hearing is not the same as seeing. – Ruby L

One thing that stuck with me were the words of the Rabbi that came along with us on our trip- he stated that, "People ask me 'where was God?" and I tell them - you're asking the wrong question! Where was MAN? God was always there - weeping with them (the victims of the holocaust) at the state of mankind".

I think this is one of the most important lessons to take from the Holocaust - what can happen when humanity is absent. We need to humanise the victims of the holocaust - putting names to all those affected as achieved by the Book of Names but also preserving sites such as Auschwitz that have rooms with great quantities of personal properties of the prisoners e.g. the piles of shoes of different sizes including those that were owned by children. The sites serve as a physical reminder of the brutal history and persuades us to be more conscious of the choices we make. This is where it has contemporary relevance -although they committed atrocities, dismissing the perpetrators as simply 'evil' or 'monsters' prevents us from understanding that these people were also human beings that were in fact capable of being compassionate and loving. Thus, their actions were the result of the society they lived in – a society built up upon misguided

beliefs, racism and prejudice. Therefore, today it is necessary to promote peace and social cohesion whilst also remembering and bearing witness to those murdered, tortured and affected by the Holocaust.. – Julia S



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
