Opportunities like these highlight the value of giving back—not only to those being supported, but also to the students who volunteer and grow through the experience.

Year 11 Subject Fair Supports Informed Sixth Form Choices



Recently, we hosted a Year 11 Subject Fair designed to support students as they continue to consider their options for sixth form. The event provided Year 11 students with the opportunity to speak directly with current Year 12 and Year 13 students about the subjects they study, helping to bring each course to life beyond the classroom.

SJP Form Captains Trained as Anti-Bullying Ambassadors

A group of enthusiastic Year 7 and 8 form captains have taken their first steps toward becoming certified Anti-Bullying Ambassadors after participating in a dynamic training workshop delivered through The Diana Award's Anti-Bullying Ambassador Programme. The full-day session equipped students with the knowledge, confidence, and practical tools to make a positive impact within the school community.

The programme aims to empower young people to tackle bullying in all its forms and to help schools build a culture of kindness, inclusion, and respect.



Building Skills, Leadership, and Confidence

During the workshop, our student leaders took part in interactive activities exploring:

- **Different types of bullying**, including online bullying and discriminatory behaviour
- **How to recognise vulnerable situations** and support students who may be affected
- **The importance of positive peer influence** and modelling respectful behaviour
- **Practical strategies** for reporting, preventing, and responding to bullying
- **Planning whole-school initiatives** and campaigns to support a culture of empathy

Trainers from The Diana Award guided students through real-life scenarios, teamwork challenges, and reflective discussions, encouraging them to think critically about how they can take active roles in shaping a safer school environment.

Students Ready to Lead Change

Staff praised the maturity, creativity, and commitment shown by the form captains throughout the session. Many students said they felt inspired by the training and ready to begin making a difference. Students will now consider how the following Catholic Social Teaching principles will now be applied as they work towards their first badge:

Human Dignity

CST teaches that every person is made in the image and likeness of God and therefore deserves respect and protection. By learning how to challenge bullying and support those who feel isolated, our ambassadors are helping ensure that every student's dignity is upheld.

Solidarity

The workshop encouraged students to stand with others, especially those who may feel vulnerable or alone. Acting in solidarity means recognising that we all belong to one human family—something our form captains committed to through their training.

The Common Good

Anti-bullying work is not just about helping individuals; it's about shaping a community where everyone can flourish. Our students discussed how they can contribute to a peaceful and supportive school atmosphere, living out this important CST principle day by day.

Next Steps: A Whole-School Approach

Over the coming months, the newly trained Anti-Bullying Ambassadors will begin working towards their next badge; inclusion, well-being or community. The students will complete five social action steps within school which may include awareness campaigns, lunchtime support initiatives, and peer-led activities designed to strengthen the school's commitment to wellbeing. They will work closely with staff to monitor progress and ensure students across all year groups feel supported. ~

Mary Poppins is one of those musicals that will always make you smile. When delivered well, it raises the spirits in a way few shows can - and the cast of St John Payne didn't just raise a smile, they raised the roof.

Tap-dancing chimney sweeps had me wanting to dust off my own tap shoes, while the polished, well-rehearsed vocals were reminiscent of classic Mackintosh productions. Add to this the fabulous characterisation, and once again this troupe proved they never fail to deliver.

A 97-strong cast flooded the stage at every opportunity, demonstrating a genuine understanding and love for this remarkable musical.

Mary Poppins herself was outstanding - even I, a regular mischief-maker, wouldn't have dared cross her. Bert expertly pushed the story along with true narrator flair, delivering laughs at just the right moments. Mrs Corry is certainly one to watch, giving a performance full of warmth, character, and joy - a future talent for sure. Miss Andrew, meanwhile, was a commanding presence on stage: brilliantly performed, utterly convincing, and terrifying in all the right ways.

I could list each cast member for their contribution to this lively, joyful evening of theatre, but there is never enough room. I can only lament those who missed out on such an awe-inspiring performance.

As the evening drew to a close, I was genuinely sad to see it end - but not before a student in a lead role delivered a rousing speech to the cast that perfectly captured the spirit of the performing arts: "It's easy to judge when you don't do it yourself, so ignore the haters and love what you do." What followed was a jubilant encore of the finale and a thoroughly deserved standing ovation for all.

Oranges In No Man's Land, by Elizabeth Laird

Oranges in no man's land is a story set in the middle-eastern country of Lebanon, painting in detail the events of the devastating civil war. Our main character is just a young girl, 10-year-old Ayesha, driven out of her home city to reside in a shelter, overcrowded with the poor, war-stricken and destitute. There, she meets a kind companion, Samar, who- despite the already present struggles of war- also has to deal with being deaf. However, after Ayesha's grandmother fails to keep up with her medication and becomes ill to the point of potential death, this brave child must journey across the grey area of Lebanon, no man's land, to source medicine from the enemy side, before she loses her grandmother forever.

For me this tale isn't just a children's book, it carries deeper themes of loss, betrayal and empathy. And the oranges aren't just a fruit, they're a symbol. Whilst Ayesha is traversing the enemy city, a boy gifts her an orange, supplying her with the strength to push on and visit the doctor. This is a gorgeous symbol of how hate and prejudice is taught, not natural. The book dotes upon us to reflect upon the brutality of the past and wonder, have we really changed at all? And if we haven't, maybe we should strive to build a better world for us, and for all the authors who believed we could too.

And then. Six. Million. Jews, pursued, so-called "exterminated" by one man's cruel command, Majdanek, Sobibor, Belzec: fields of faith and loss where pain and sorrow became crowned with its name.

Beyond the heaps of robbed shoes, beyond the whispers, the memories dead, the forced labour of that innocent hand, A silent voice did not tremble but rose, a strong phantom, for justice. A friar stood aflame. Who? How?

And then. Two. Hundred. Thousand. with disabilities cast. Like Incense. Away Buchenwald, Lublin, Dachau: shadows of shame still stretched today across all land. Ten men were chosen, chosen to die: their sentence a chime of Hell. For the camp, just another day... A father's tears, a family, a life, love, cut short; but another stepped forward. Calm. Valiant. Following a sacrifice, the Mother of the Most High. a tender, raising hand.

And then. Two. Million. Polish citizens cast back to dust, taken before their time, Sachsenhausen, Mauthausen, Sobibor: the bitter, ill-glowing jewels of Hitler's hate. Yet burning, faithful hope wore then blue and white stripes, shone like his visions. red and shone white, a beacon bright in genocide, in the worst of our past, in history's ghastly grime, Militia Immaculata founded, Niepokalonów raised, a man of faith fell with grace to his coffin's gate.

And this man of faith. Prisoner. Number. 1.6.6.7.0. Saint Maximilian Kolbe, pray for us, From a missionary in Japan to sheltering the preyed. The Jews. in. Nineteen. Forties. A time so detested, though a time so weak, so current, so frail. At just. Forty. Seven. years, you laid down your blessed life, a true Marian devotee to your murder, a mirror for us. Luminous. Sacrifice. Servanthood. Trust. "Hatred is not creative." Your wonderful, warm words. Still, our war-chained world needs your Agape. Needs that moment in that camp. to prevail.

And what still radiates through the dark, through the death of those days, that are like these days, our days, we still fear? Light, never overcome, needed then, needed now... the futile, destructive, devastating fire, not of Auschwitz's Hell, but of Heaven that will not flee: The flame of Christ, the flame of fellowship, your flame, burning bright, shining clear, Your life, a true pilgrim, a path of love made flesh: yes, you, Saint Maximilian Kolbe.
