Mass Lobby of Parliament

25 years ago, many Christians came together to call for the cancellation of debt owed by the world's poorest countries. This successful initiative saw countries like Uganda doubling primary school enrolment, through their grant of £715 million worth of debt relief, allowing more money to be focussed on tackling climate change in these poorer countries.

In the heart of this current Jubilee Year of 2025, on the 9th of July, 4 students (from Year 12 and Year 10) were given the amazing opportunity to become Pilgrims of Hope at a time when 1 in 4 countries (a number that has more than doubled since 2015) are facing debt crisis once again, only worsened by the ever-growing issue of climate change. This Mass Lobby 2025 served as a unique opportunity for Catholics (through the vital organisation of CAFOD) across the country to ask their MPs to urgently take action to tackle this growing, entwined issue, with more than 100,000 people having already signed the Church Global Jubilee petition, a campaign to cancel debt. This is a crippling debt, with about 3.3 billion people now living in countries where debt-related payments are greater than expenditure on health or education! A widespread social injustice affecting more than a third of the global population, and that's where the importance of our day in Westminster came into play.

Talking to our local MP, Marie Goldman, we discussed how climate change is causing increased natural disasters (such as droughts, hurricanes, and floods) in low-income countries (the lowest contributors to this huge issue of climate change) are often forced to borrow money to rebuild, increasing their debt, meaning that climate-vulnerable countries are made to reduce spending money on climate mitigation, making a future natural disaster more likely and worse, beginning the painstaking cycle again. The point of this conversation was to campaign Marie Goldman to support the call for debt relief to the discussed lowincome, climate-vulnerable countries, debts that are owed to rich-world institutions, starting a ripple effect leading to hopeful initiatives, including calling the UK Government to contribute its fair share towards the New Collective Quantified Goal on Climate Finance. Our climate-focused discussion with our MP also included calling her to further support the environment in other, meaningful ways, from her valuable position, calling on the UK Government to support the creation of a fair global debt system in which debtor countries are properly represented and in which human and environmental rights are prioritised. But not everything we discussed was so far from home, with our conversation turning to improving Chelmsford's public transport (such as by, hopefully, improving bus timetables, so it is easier to get by students leaving school), a vital step in the long journey towards eradicating air pollution.

Adding towards CAFOD's "Act Now, Change Forever," campaign, this educative day saw us also meeting with climate activist groups from Chelmsford, building pathways to strengthen our school's Earth Society and positive environmental goals, as well as learning more about the inspiring work of CAFOD, the WWF, and the Laudato Si' Action Platform, all great springboards towards governmental and global change to cancel debt and cause real, meaningful, global change, all going towards saving and preserving our environment.

The bottom line is that this eventful, extremely hopeful day of campaigning, lobbying, connecting and learning, embodied our role as Pilgrims of Hope, a true inspiration to follow Catholic Social Teaching (as "stewards" of our world-wide environment) and play our part in reducing climate change on a local scale, spiralling to a global one. Thank you to Katy and Mrs Schluter for arranging and facilitating this inspiring, viewpoint-enriching trip, allowing our school community to play our part in this momental Mass Lobby of

Parliament!

Key Stage Four maths Functional skills in mathematics

Over the past 5 years the maths department have worked outside of curriculum time to offer alternative pathways in mathematics. One of the big success stories is Functional Mathematics and we are delighted that this programme has now been integrated into our curriculum time.

We can announce that the students in year 11 Functional Maths class have achieved their L2 (GCSE pass equivalent) and L1 passes – we now wish them all the best for their upcoming GCSE results.



Further maths GCSE - Success of GCSE Further Maths Intervention Programme

We are delighted to report the outstanding success of our GCSE Further Maths Intervention Programme, which ran throughout the spring and summer terms in preparation for this year's examinations.

The sessions, held during lunch times on Tuesday and Friday, focused on strengthening students' understanding of key topics such as algebraic manipulation, functions, matrices, and calculus. Designed to provide extra support in a small-group setting, the intervention allowed students to revisit challenging areas, practice exam-style questions, and build their confidence ahead of their final assessments. Of the 18 students that started the course, 14 of them sat their GCSE in Further Maths – this is our highest cohort ever and is a testament to both the students and teachers dedication. We can't wait for the results in August and we look forward to welcoming you back to the SJP 6th form maths cohort!

A Big Thank You to Mrs. Peterson and Mrs Sanal for going above and beyond by running these sessions to make a real difference to our students' confidence and performance. These sessions provided invaluable one-to-one support and gave students the opportunity to ask questions, tackle tricky topics, and prepare thoroughly for their exams. We are very much looking forward to welcoming our next Further Maths GCSE cohort in September 2025!

Enrichment 1 - Maths Masterclasses – Zavier

In January, myself and a classmate were invited to attend a set of Maths Masterclasses at KEGS with some other Year 9 students from a selection of schools across Essex. This enriching set of workshops enabled myself and the other candidates to take an active role in learning Maths from a unique programme which included subjects from the real world, and beyond the school curriculum.

This national network of Masterclasses was run by Professors from the Royal Institution and has inspired me to grow in confidence within Maths. With two and a half hours weekly committed to exploring Mathematics in the following exhilarating subjects of art and sculpture, computer science, design and cryptography, Maths has really been brought to life for myself and the other 50 students at the weekly classes. These interesting and interactive Saturday morning sessions have further opened my eyes to the wide variety of opportunities that this subject holds for my own future. With thanks to Mrs Sanal and Mr Newman for this great opportunity!

Enrichment 2 – UKMT – Junior maths challenge

Over the course of the year, all year groups have been involved in the individual maths challenge. This summer term was the turn of year 7&8. These students achieved our best results ever with 80 of the 120 achieving a Bronze, Silver or Gold award – congratulations to all students involved.

A special mention to Marco A, Agastya D, Cornelius B and Rose C who achieved a Gold award and were only 1 mark from the next phase of the competition.

Additional Tuition sessions Mrs Machin – Lead i/c Intervention Year 11 Math tutor sessions

Throughout this academic year, if you were to have walked the Bosco Maths corridor after school on a Tuesday or before school on a Monday, you would see groups of Year 11 students working together, with the support of their teachers, on their Maths skills. They were working to improve their recall of important formulas, honing their problem-solving skills when the Maths appears in a totally new context and building confidence in their mathematical ability.

We are immensely proud of the students who have consistently been attending our GCSE intervention. Their continued hard work is a credit to them and will help them achieve their desired grade.

A shout out must also go to those year 11 students who have turned up, bright and early the morning of their exam for that last-minute confidence boast and support before they sit their exam!

St John Payne Athletes Deliver Record-Breaking Season

St John Payne students have enjoyed a phenomenal athletics season, achieving outstanding results at both the ESAA Track and Field Cup and the annual District Athletics Championships.

At the ESAA Cup, four teams qualified for regional finals—no small feat, with A final qualification requiring a top-12 finish in East Anglia, and B final needing a top-30 placing.

- The Junior Boys placed 5th in the Regional A Final, with a score that ranked them 12th nationally.
- The Intermediate Boys stormed to 1st place in the Regional B Final.
- The Junior Girls took 2nd in the Regional B Final, while the Intermediate Girls finished 7th, capping off a strong all-round showing for the school.

In the District Athletics Championships, St John Payne continued their strong performances:

The Boys retained their overall title, and the Girls claimed the overall trophy for the second time, their last win coming in 2017.

Both boys' and girls' teams won the relay trophy, with the girls winning every age group and the boys taking the Year 8 title.

A remarkable four district records were broken:

- Adrian (Year 8) 200m in 24.04s
- Jasmin (Year 10) 200m in 25.05s
- Alicja (Year 10) 100m in 12.15s
- Year 10 Girls Relay Team 49.88s

These results reflect an exceptional season for athletics at St John Payne and are a testament to the dedication, effort, and countless hours of training put in by the students throughout the year.



Cricket season

Geography Highlights



Geography Department-GCSE Fieldtrip

It has been an extremely busy yet fruitful summer term for SJP Geographers, thankfully blessed with plenty of sunshine! Back in May we had the pleasure of accompanying 42 Year 10 GCSE Geographers to Dorset for three days. Here students undertook two fieldwork enquiries, the first, a Human Geography Study into the impacts of seasonal tourism in Lulworth, as an example of a honeypot site. The second, a Physical Geography study into longshore drift flows and evaluating the impacts of coastal management techniques along Swanage Bay.

The students were exceptional ambassadors for SJP, really throwing themselves into both fieldwork projects, working hard to gather data throughout the days and continuing to do so on the follow up work which continued into the evening! Members of the public in Swanage complemented our staff on how wonderfully our students were conducting themselves, which was lovely to hear. Everyone seemed to enjoy the whole experience of being away and emersed in Geography for a few days, as well as a good game of Frisbee golf in the evening! Students evaluated the accuracy and reliability of their data back at school, and the understanding they gained during their fieldwork enquiries will help them to answer exam questions in their Year 11 GCSE Geography exam. Well done Year 10!

A-Level Fieldtrip

A few weeks later we were back off on our travels again, this time to Southwold on the Suffolk coast with the Year 12 A-Level Geographers. Year 12 Geographers have to conduct an independent fieldwork enquiry project, which contributes towards 20% of their final A-Level Geography grade. We were very lucky to this year be using expertise from Chris at the Geography Fieldwork Academy, who introduced the students to a wide range of possible themes and ideas for their projects and a variety of data collection methods and presentation techniques to choose from. Once the students had designed their projects, they set off collecting their data. Not an easy task to do completely independently and they all did very well, rewarded with some fish and chips on the beach in the evening.





Year 7 Geography RS Cross-Curricular Day

SJP Year 7's also had a turn to be immersed in Geography for the day, through the eyes of Religious Studies. On Tuesday 10th June the Geography and RS department ran a crosscurricular day themed around the Sanctity of Life. Throughout the day the Year 7s took part in three different activities that raised their awareness to injustices around the world regarding trade, modern day slavery and poverty. Year 7 trees

For the last three years, SJP Earth Society has purchased a silver birch sapling for each incoming Year 7 form. These beautiful trees are planted at the start of the new school year and identified with a plaque made by Mrs Coleman that shows the Year 7 House and the year the tree was planted. We are excited to see the trees and students grow over the coming years and look forward to planting new trees for each new form in the future.

Inside recycling bins will be purchased by the Earth Society, using donations made by YOU and your families.

Just like any large site, our school produces a large amount of waste. Unfortunately, a significant amount of this is not recycled but instead placed in general waste or worse discarded and left for our wonderful Site Staff to litter pick. As a school we intend to eliminate single use plastic, eventually! In the short term everyone can help make a difference by actively seeking the correct bin for their waste (or holding on to it until they do find the right bin) and choosing to use reusable items where possible (i.e. lunch boxes and water bottles). Reusable, BPA free, biodegradable water bottles are available for £2.50 via Parent Pay or from Miss Dabbs classroom, A116.

From March 31 2025 all businesses in England, including schools, are required to separate food waste and recyclables (paper, card, glass, metals, and plastics) from general waste. These changes are part of a larger national effort to improve recycling rates and reduce environmental impact. SJP Earth Society is leading the way by introducing cardboard recycling bins specifically for paper and plastic recycling and making them highly visable and accessible around the school. Our outside recycling bins are collected by Chelmsford City Council – if the wrong items are placed in the bins they will refuse to recycle the whole content of the bin, it will go to landfill.

Workshops included sessions on completing a UCAS application, how to select the best university and course, and top tips for writing a fantastic personal statement. These practical sessions gave students a clear sense of what lies ahead and how to begin preparing now.

We were also delighted to welcome guest speakers from the University of Essex, who talked about the university pathway, and from Anglia Ruskin University, who delivered an insightful session on degree apprenticeships. Both talks gave students a broader view of the options available and what they can expect from different routes. Students are now encouraged to continue researching universities and courses over the summer and to begin drafting their personal statements. They should aim to have a first draft ready to share with their tutors when they return in September.

It was a productive and inspiring day, and we're excited to see how Year 12 build on this momentum as they move into their final year at school.

Preparing for University Applications

Did you know?



Approximately 700,000 people apply for full-time undergraduate courses at over 380 universities and colleges across the UK each year.

The competition for places can be fierce so it is good for your son/daughter to be as prepared as possible.

What can you do?

A key thing to remember is that preparation is the key for a successful university application – and that it isn't always just about the grades. Here are some of the things that university admissions tutors will be looking out for, and what we will be doing to help:

A Strong Personal Statement: A student's personal statement should show passion and enthusiasm for their chosen subject area and demonstrate the wider skills and experiences that will enable them to succeed at university. If you can, prompt them to think about things they could do to enhance their application - the sooner the better!

A Passion for their Subject Area: Encourage your child to complete extra reading, engage with TED talks, complete MOOCS (online courses), and think outside the restrictions of the exam specifications. Most of these things are free but could make a real difference to them.

Character Development: The kind of things that will make them stand out from other applicants are the LORIC attributes: Leadership, Organisation, Resilience, Initiative and Communication. They often find it quite difficult to recognise their own strengths in these areas - it is helpful for you to remind them of their areas of strength.

Work Experience: Successful applications for some courses are enhanced by work experience. If you know anyone who would be willing to have them in to their work for a day or two, this can really help. It is also worth noting that the skills acquired through parttime paid and voluntary work are also valued by many universities; just make sure any part-time, 'small' job doesn't turn into one that distracts from their work.

University visits: Attending university Open Days is invaluable for a variety of reasons – and many are over the weekend so there's often no need to miss lessons. Students will be able to speak to course tutors, test the travel arrangements to and from home, look at the location, accommodation...a whole wealth of things that will ensure that they are making an informed choice. The universities often run sessions for parents at their Open Days.

Preparing to apply for an apprenticeship

Did you know?



There are a whole range of apprenticeships available, and some provide the opportunity to achieve a full degree. They are increasingly being viewed as a genuine, high-quality alternative to a traditional university degree.

Apprenticeships have undergone significant changes in recent years, extending to a wide range of professions. Entry points are more and more likely to be at 17+ and 18+ in the future.



What can you do?

There are a number of apprenticeship levels:

- Traineeships: no formal qualifications
- Intermediate Apprenticeships: equivalent to five good GCSEs
- Advanced Apprenticeships: equivalent to A-levels
- Higher Apprenticeships: can lead to a HND, HNC or Foundation Degree
- Degree Apprenticeships: lead to a full undergraduate degree and include study at a university.

Sixth Forms/colleges tend to focus on applications to Higher and Degree apprenticeships. Both Higher and Degree apprenticeships offer salaries; they are proper jobs but provide training and qualifications.

Higher Apprenticeships can be accessed in a range of careers such as law, broadcasting, engineering, finance, IT. The list is constantly growing. For example, a five-year Higher Apprenticeship in Law can result in the position of a Chartered Legal Executive, equivalent to a lawyer. The BBC offers, amongst other things, a Production Assistant Apprenticeship which involves working on live TV programmes, dramas, sport and radio.

Degree Apprenticeships can result in a wide range of professional careers, from a nuclear scientist to a solicitor. They are developed by employers, universities and professional bodies. Time is split between university and the workplace; the apprentice is fully salaried and, very importantly, pays no university fees.

What can you do?

Preparing for Post-16 Education



Information for parents and carers

Did you know?



There is a significant difference between Year 11 and Year 12. The courses are more challenging in the sixth form, and the pressures on students are significant.

However, there are a number of ways in which students can prepare for this change and help to bridge the gap.

What can you do?

Many colleges run a Post-16 Preparation Day soon after the completion of GCSEs and a number of things happen that will help to prepare your child for post-16 education. These may involve taster lessons or taster days where they can sample the lessons and routines of being in a more independent setting.

- The transition to being in post-16 education should start happening over the summer as students await results and prepare for starting courses. It is helpful if you can encourage them to do some background reading on their subject, or perhaps watch some TED talks or documentaries.
- Many schools give out summer work that needs to be completed for the first few weeks back – ask your child if they have this to complete.
- It would also be profitable if the summer break was used as an opportunity for them to widen their experience by visiting museums, the theatre

 or absolutely anything that gets them involved more deeply in things that interest them and perhaps pushes them out of their comfort zone.
 Many museums and art galleries are free, and many others have a reduced student rate.

- Your child may come home telling you they have 'free periods' – most of the time these are actually 'study periods' or 'independent learning' periods where students should be doing wider reading, prescribed work or working independently. Check what the expectations are!
- Be prepared for a dip! The jump from KS4 to KS5 is a big one. Be prepared that your son or daughter may find the new level quite challenging at first, and it takes a few weeks to become comfortable with the new standard of work and expectations.
- If they have summer work, encourage them to do
 it in plenty of time rather than the panic and dash
 towards the end of the holidays.
