




ALICE LOWER SCHOOL PLAY - SEPTEMBER 2025



Preparing to apply for an apprenticeship

Information for parents and carers





Did you know?



There are a whole range of apprenticeships available, and some provide the opportunity to achieve a full degree. They are increasingly being viewed as a genuine, high-quality alternative to a traditional university degree.

Apprenticeships have undergone significant changes in recent years, extending to a wide range of professions. Entry points are more and more likely to be at 17+ and 18+ in the future.

What can you do?



- Traineeships: no formal qualifications
- Intermediate Apprenticeships: equivalent to five good GCSEs
- Advanced Apprenticeships: equivalent to A-levels
- Higher Apprenticeships: can lead to a HND, HNC or Foundation Degree
- Degree Apprenticeships: lead to a full undergraduate degree and include study at a university.

Sixth Forms/colleges tend to focus on applications to Higher and Degree apprenticeships. Both Higher and Degree apprenticeships offer salaries; they are proper jobs but provide training and qualifications.

Higher Apprenticeships can be accessed in a range of careers such as law, broadcasting, engineering, finance, IT. The list is constantly growing. For example, a five-year Higher Apprenticeship in Law can result in the position of a Chartered Legal Executive, equivalent to a lawyer. The BBC offers, amongst other things, a



Degree Apprenticeships can result in a wide range of professional careers, from a nuclear scientist to a solicitor. They are developed by employers, universities and professional bodies. Time is split between university and the workplace; the apprentice is fully salaried and, very importantly, pays no university fees.

What can you do?

Preparing for University Applications

Did you know?



Approximately 700,000 people apply for full-time undergraduate courses at over 380 universities and colleges across the UK each year.

The competition for places can be fierce so it is good for your son/daughter to be as prepared as possible.



What can you do?

A key thing to remember is that preparation is the key for a successful university application – and that it isn't always just about the grades. Here are some of the things that university admissions tutors will be looking out for, and what we will be doing to help:

A Strong Personal Statement: A student's personal statement should show passion and enthusiasm for their chosen subject area and demonstrate the wider skills and experiences that will enable them to succeed at university. If you can, prompt them to think about things they could do to enhance their application - the sooner the better!

A Passion for their Subject Area: Encourage your child to complete extra reading, engage with TED talks, complete MOOCS (online courses), and think outside the restrictions of the exam specifications. Most of these things are free but could make a real difference to them.

Character Development: The kind of things that will make them stand out from other applicants are the LORIC attributes: Leadership, Organisation, Resilience, Initiative and Communication. They often find it quite difficult to recognise their own strengths in these areas - it is helpful for you to remind them of their areas of strength.

Work Experience: Successful applications for some courses are enhanced by work experience. If you know anyone who would be willing to have them in to their work for a day or two, this can really help. It is also worth noting that the skills acquired through parttime paid and voluntary work are also valued by many universities; just make sure any part-time, 'small' job doesn't turn into one that distracts from their work.

University visits: Attending university Open Days is invaluable for a variety of reasons – and many are over the weekend so there's often no need to miss lessons. Students will be able to speak to course tutors, test the travel arrangements to and from home, look at the location, accommodation...a whole wealth of things that will ensure that they are making an informed choice. The universities often run sessions for parents at their Open Days.



Preparing for Post-16 Education



Information for parents and carers

Did you know?



There is a significant difference between Year 11 and Year 12. The courses are more challenging in the sixth form, and the pressures on students are significant.

However, there are a number of ways in which students can prepare for this change and help to bridge the gap.





What can you do?

Many colleges run a Post-16 Preparation Day soon after the completion of GCSEs and a number of things happen that will help to prepare your child for post-16 education. These may involve taster lessons or taster days where they can sample the lessons and routines of being in a more independent setting.

- The transition to being in post-16 education should start happening over the summer as students await results and prepare for starting courses. It is helpful if you can encourage them to do some background reading on their subject, or perhaps watch some TED talks or documentaries.
- Many schools give out summer work that needs to be completed for the first few weeks back – ask your child if they have this to complete.
- It would also be profitable if the summer break was used as an opportunity for them to widen their experience by visiting museums, the theatre

- or absolutely anything that gets them involved more deeply in things that interest them and perhaps pushes them out of their comfort zone.
 Many museums and art galleries are free, and many others have a reduced student rate.
- Your child may come home telling you they have 'free periods' – most of the time these are actually 'study periods' or 'independent learning' periods where students should be doing wider reading, prescribed work or working independently. Check what the expectations are!
- Be prepared for a dip! The jump from KS4 to KS5 is a big one. Be prepared that your son or daughter may find the new level quite challenging at first, and it takes a few weeks to become comfortable with the new standard of work and expectations.
- If they have summer work, encourage them to do
 it in plenty of time rather than the panic and dash
 towards the end of the holidays.



Morning basketball dubs take place in the **Sports Hall at 7:45am**, with sessions running as follows:


- Year 7 Boys Tuesday mornings











5 top tips to balance screen time

Set boundaries to help them build good online habits

Children seek out rules to follow so its best these come from you and not their peers.

Set up a family agreement that you all sign up to, to manage expectations of what they should and shouldn't be doing online. These boundaries should help them prioritise sleep, face to face interactions and family time to strike a healthy balance.

Stay engaged in what they do online

Take an interest in their digital world to better guide them as they become more socially active online and start to draw from friends and online sources to build their identity.

Give them the space to be more independent and build their resilience online to ensure they make smart choices about how they use tech. The more you understand how your child interacts online and check-in with them about their interest, and challenges online, the easier it will be for them to come to you if they are concerned or worried about something.

Equip them with know-how to manage risks online

Have regular conversations with them about ways to deal with a range of risks that they may be exposed to such as seeing inappropriate content or being cyberbullied.

Make sure they know when and where to seek help if they need it and what tools they can use to deal with it. Try to reassure them that you won't overreact if they get something wrong.

Give them the space to become digitally resilient

As they get older and more confident in their digital world, it's important to
