Our catering offer has required considerable planning, organisation and efficiency, and we thank Ms Williams and the catering team for continuing to provide a wide range of options.

'Inclusion is part of our Behaviour management policy where a student spends a designated period with me in the Inclusion room because of an escalated behaviour sanction. Work is set for them by their teachers but it is also an opportunity for the student to reflect on the actions that lead to their inclusion and how they can change their behaviour to ensure they can have the most positive experience both in school and in life. Managing the inclusion room can be challenging but also very rewarding particularly when we turn negative behaviour into a positive response going forward.

This role dovetails nicely with my role as Foundation Governor where I am involved in student and staff welfare, as well as Admissions and training for fellow Governors. I am also an exam invigilator during certain periods of the year. At home, life is always very busy. Bikeability

In September, all students in Year 7 were offered the chance to take part in a Bikeability course funded by Essex County Council as part of its Stop. Swap. GO! campaign to increase sustainable travel in the county. The aim of the course is about gaining practical skills and understanding how to cycle on today's roads. During November, more than fifty Year 7 students have successfully completed training in either Level 2 or Level 3 Bikeability courses.

In order to successfully pass each stage, Level 2 riders had to:

- Cycle safely and responsibly
- Identify and respond to hazards
- Start and stop on-road journeys
- Maintain suitable riding positions
- Share the road with others and communicate with other road users
- Comply with signals, signs and road markings
- Manage risk when cycling

- Negotiate junctions (pass side roads, turn at T junctions, and crossroads and roundabouts if present)





Bikeability continued...

In addition to meeting these standards, the Level 3 course aims to develop riders' skills and confidence so they can ride in diverse road environments. Students who passed this level had to:

- Plan a journey
- Plan to and ride assertively everywhere cycling is permitted
- Maintain suitable riding positions

- Cooperate with and respect other road users (including avoiding driver blind spots and riding with others)

- Pass queuing traffic and use junctions controlled by traffic lights (if present)
- Use cycle infrastructure and multi lane roads (if present)
- Ride on roads with speeds above 30 mph (if present)

Hopefully, this will be the start of an annual opportunity to improve cycling standards and help students to be even safer when out on the roads. The instructors were complimentary about our students and it has been great to see such a take up from Year 7 - well done!
