Chelmsford Science and Engineering Society competition.

This is an annual competition to showcase the fantastic work that students across Essex do in Design and Technology, Science and Engineering. Students are judged by three sets of Engineers from various different companies across Essex and London. Both students performed fantastic on the day and was invited to the Celebration evening on the 5th of July at the Anglia Ruskin University.

History- Development and Features of Castles by Eloise in 7C

During this previous half-term we've expanded on our understanding of the development and features of castles with our teacher Mrs Smith. She has taught us about the defensive features and attacking features of castles as well as different kinds of castles. For example, a Motte and Bailey castle is mainly made of wood so it is quick and cheap to build. The Motte being a mound/hill and the Bailey being the living area. However, there are disadvantages as a Motte and Bailey castle is not very big, could be burnt by fire and also rot over time.

Other types of castle we learnt about were Stone-Keep, Square-Keep and Concentric castles these would use stone as a building material to improve the chances against an attack with fire. Similar to Motte and Bailey castles they would be built in a raised area to allow the owners a good view of the land around so that they were aware of any attackers. Other defensive features included **crenellations or battlements** these are the squares cut into the top of the castle so archers could fire arrows and then hid from the enemy; **machicolations** which are the sections of the wall that jutted out, with holes in the floor allowing archers to fire at attackers at the foot of the wall. Sometimes even a **portcullis** which is an iron gate with spikes on the bottom. All of the features helped the defence of the castle if it came under attack.

The most common tactic for attacking a castle was to put it **under siege** – this would be done by surrounding the castle with men and **catapults** so that no-one could leave or enter the castle. **Catapult** would be used to fire stones, fireballs or other objects such as dead sheep, cattle or plague victims, at the castle walls or into the castle itself. The inhabitants of the castle would run out of food, or become ill from disease which forced them to surrender. Another way, attackers could try to defeat the defenders would be by using **Battering Ram** as the thick stone walls of the Stone Keep castles were difficult for men to knock down. The battering ram was particularly useful since the weight of several men would be put behind it.

These are the kind of things that we have been learning this previous half-term and we can now recognise specific features and types of castles thanks to our great topic and even more fabulous and creative teacher Mrs Smith. Who as part of our learning organised for us to build and evaluate our own castles, some examples are included in this article.

Athletics success - Onyeka

Last summer Onyeka had huge success in the 400m Hurdles, winning Gold in both the U17 Essex Schools and Essex Counties competitions, whilst also breaking the championships records. This success saw him have the opportunity to represent both England and GB & NI and also become the U17 England Champion in the 400m Hurdles.

This season he has had to move up an age group to U20, but his success has continued as he has already won the South of England indoor championships, whilst finishing 3rd nationally. His latest competition saw him represent GB & NI juniors in the Loughborough International on the 22nd May. He ran a personal best time of 51.91s which sees him as the fastest U20 in the UK.

Congratulations to Onyeka on being selected for the U20 World Championships in Cali Colombia, winning the 400mH in 51.58 at the England championships today, with a Heat time yesterday of 51.29 securing age 17 UK record - fantastic achievements!



Summer Reading Challenge 2022

Organised by charity The Reading Agency (www.readingagency.org.uk) and the UK public library network since 1999, the **Summer Reading Challenge** is the UK's biggest annual reading promotion for children aged 4 to 11. Last year, over 700,000 children took part!

The Summer Reading Challenge combines **FREE** access to books with fun, creative activities during the summer holidays. Throughout the Challenge, library staff and young volunteers support the children, helping them to discover new authors and illustrators and to explore a wide range of different types of books and ways of reading.

The national curriculum for English aims to ensure that pupils develop the habit of reading widely and often for both pleasure and information.

How the Challenge works

- Children sign up through their local library and receive a Gadgeteers collector poster.
- Children set a reading goal and borrow and read library books of their own choice during the summer, collecting special stickers to complete their poster and extra incentives along the way.
- Library staff and volunteers are on hand to advise and run family-friendly activities.

Online safety – Summer 2022

Children and young people today are growing up in an increasingly complex world, living much of their lives online. The internet provides many opportunities for our children, but also brings with it risks. We need to help our children understand these risks and equip them with the skills to keep themselves as safe as possible online. We also need to be confident

with the skills to keep themselves as safe as possible online. We also need to be confident that they understand how to report online harm and where to access help and support if they need it. Any child can be vulnerable online, and their vulnerability can fluctuate depending on their age, developmental stage and personal circumstance.

It is important to teach children how to navigate the online world and equip them with sufficient knowledge and understanding to keep themselves safer online. General messages about online safety are appropriate, as to refer to specific potential harmful websites and apps can increase risk. The key to help children and young people develop are:

- ✓ How to evaluate what they see online children need to be able to assess and make judgements about what they see online, and not automatically assume that what they see is real or appropriate
- ✓ How to recognise techniques used for persuasion children should understand the techniques that are often used to persuade or manipulate others
- ✓ Online behaviour children should understand what acceptable and unacceptable online behaviour (in themselves and others) looks like. They should apply the same standards of behaviour and honesty on and offline, including respect for others.
- ✓ How to identify online risks children should be able to identify possible online risks and make informed decisions about how to act
- ✓ How and when to seek support children should understand safe ways in which to seek support if they are concerned or upset by something they have seen online, and also how to report online harm
