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In the days preceding the announcement in March that schools were to enter an extended period of partial closure, our thoughts in planning our educational provision and pastoral care were already in large part concentrated upon when it would again become possible to open the school to all students on a full time basis. The beginning of this academic year was therefore greeted with even greater excitement and anticipation than is ordinarily the case, and we were delighted to welcome the students back.

As anticipated, just as in the days leading to school closure when it was clear to all that the announcement was pending, the students have responded with great maturity. The circumstances in which we have been required to operate have in no way dampened their energy and excitement. They continue to ensure the school is alive with the St John Payne spirit we all hold so dear.

With restrictions on our ability to welcome visitors to the school, we have developed our capacity for virtual events. This will see Year 7 parents & carers invited to our Parents' Meet the Tutor Evening on Thursday 12th November, following which we will continue to host virtual events until circumstances again allow us to welcome visitors in greater number than is currently possible. Whilst we are delighted that the priests of the Norbertine community at St Philip's Priory are able to visit to celebrate Year group masses, in place of our Mass for the Holy Souls, we will pray for the departed souls beloved of all our community, whose names will also be held in prayer by Abbot Hugh and the Norbertine community during their mass at Our Lady Immaculate.



With the first half term of each academic year always central to schools' efforts to showcase their communities to prospective families seeking education both for Year 7 & Year 12, you will know that circumstances also precluded open evening in its traditional form. Having to forego the custom of opening the school to many hundreds of visitors who would have benefitted from a tour with one of our students, we are delighted that our promotional film captures such an authentic representation of the love, guidance and support our students enjoy here.

As is custom following open evening, we have been able to host tours during the working day. Though we have been unable to allow students - always our greatest ambassadors - to showcase their school, we are delighted that visitors have been able to experience in person the spirit that the film exudes, and which is of course primarily created by the students, always at the heart of our community.

Throughout Black History Month we have shared histories of eminent black figures via SJP Live. Departments continue to identify curriculum opportunities to promote and celebrate black and ethnic minority history, whilst Mrs Coleman has launched a number of competitions that have yielded wonderful creativity. Our community is blessed in its diversity, with an ethnicity approaching 40%. In a recent discussion with one Year 7 class alone, there was scarcely a student who did not have a parent from a different ethnic heritage or national background.

We continue the student voice that Mrs Iciek launched to such powerful effect last year, which saw black and ethnic minority student leaders gather views from all quarters of our culturally diverse community. Resoundingly it is observed that whilst Black History Month offers a wonderful celebration of the contributions black and ethnic minority cultures have for millennia made not only to our society and civilisation but across the globe, the truest mark of a multi-cultural, multi-ethnic and multi-heritage society such as we enjoy in radiant abundance at St John Payne would be for such a month to be unnecessary - a sentiment wholly endorsed by all who work here.

Ever committed to ensuring that all our students experience their time at St John Payne as a home from home in which they are individually known, valued and loved, we are proud to engage with The Prosperity Project, which supports community development and inclusion within ethnically diverse schools. Our continued professional development will see us work with the team throughout the year, encompassing aspects including curriculum & classroom, language, mental health, and students in the future.
