Early in September this allowed us to welcome parents & carers to the school for our Year 10 & 11 and Year 7 & 8 information evenings.

We have also seen the return of our weekly Form group Masses in the chapel each Friday. Year 10 students attended Retreats at Aylesford Priory, and the Year 13 Leadership Team attended their Retreat at Walsingham House in Abbotswick.

As the return of customary practices continues, I end by thanking the students for establishing such a purposeful and pleasant atmosphere. Visitors frequently comment on the warm welcome they receive - a testament to the values upon which the school is founded. We wish our whole community a restful half term break, and we look forward to welcoming students upon our return.














































































NEW STAFF INTRODUCTIONS

Over the summer I had the opportunity to compete at the national and international stage in the 400m hurdles, a relatively new event for me, having only ran one 400mH race at the end of the 2020 outdoor season.

My first national final was in July: the English Schools' Championships, where I came 2nd, running PB at the time - my first ever national medal. Coming 2nd here meant that I was selected to run for the England U17 Schools team at the SIAB International in late September, earning my first international kit. Then, just under a month later, I came 1st at the U17 British Championships, earning my first national title at a soggy Manchester.

Just a week before the British Championships, I received a call from the Great Britain team, who had selected me to run against U20s at the Manchester International taking place 2 days after my prom in August - whilst still being an U17. Because this was an U20 meet, it meant I had to run over hurdles 3 inches higher than I usually did, as the U20 hurdles are higher than the U17 hurdles. At the Manchester International, I ran a 1 second PB of 54.07, which put me 5th in the UK U20 400m hurdles as an U17. This time also put me 8th in the U18 European rankings and 42nd in the U18 World rankings over the higher height.

My time of 54.16 over the U17 height hurdles as of 16th August meant I was selected to run at the UK School Games National Finals in Loughborough on the 4th of September. Having tested positive for COVID the day after running for GB, I tested negative only 2 days before I travelled up to Loughborough - this meant I hadn't trained for over 2 weeks. However, this didn't stop me from picking up a silver medal in the 400m hurdles, and running the 1st leg of the 4x400m relay, putting my team in the lead, eventually coming 4th.

The last major race of the season came in the form of the SIAB International for England, against U17 athletes from Scotland, Wales and Ireland. Coming into this race in the best form of the season, and ranked 2nd in the

UK, I was looking to take my first international win. I lead the whole race, until around 50m to go, where coming off the last hurdle, I had nothing left in the tank, and getting overtaken with about 30m to go, finishing with the silver medal. However, despite losing after leading the majority of the race, I ran a near one second PB, taking my time down from 54.16 to 53.31. This time put me 22nd in the U18 European rankings, and 31st in the U18 world rankings for the lower height. At this meet, I also ran the first leg of the 4x400m England relay squad, leading as I handed the baton over, ultimately finishing first - my first international gold medal. The picture I've included is from this meet, with the England flag and my gold and silver medals.

Going into 2022, my main goal is to make the Great Britain U20 world championships team and qualify for the final as a first year in that age group. My long-term goal is to qualify for the Team GB Olympic team for the 2024 Olympics in Paris.

Modern Languages residential cultural visit to Paris

We are planning a very exciting visit to **Paris** for year 9-13 pupils for 4 nights/5 days from **Thursday 31st March to Monday 4th April 2022** (first weekend of the school Easter break).

A separate letter will outline a 5-day visit to the Rhineland, Germany for July 2022.

- transport to and from Paris by coach and Euro Tunnel,
- a 4-night Half Board stay at European Campus Sainte Thérèse just outside of Paris,
- entrance to Parc Astérix
- visit to the Stade de France football stadium
- river Seine cruise
- guided tour of the Catacombes
- visits around the Eiffel Tower and Montmartre areas.

During the trip there will be multiple opportunities for ordering food, shopping and some free time too. The students will need some spending money for lunches, treats and souvenirs.

There are **approximately 50 places** available on this trip and the following criteria apply:

Focus on Young Carers

Who is a Young Carer?

Young carers are children and young people under 18 years old who provide regular and on-going care to another person who is physically or mentally ill, disabled or misuses substances.

Many young people don't see themselves as carers and may not realise there is practical and emotional support available in Essex.

You may be a young carer if you:

care for a family member, because of illness, disability or old age

help someone with bathing or dressing, going to the toilet or getting into/out of bed

need to cook for your family

look after money or organise the family budget

help anyone to take medication regularly

collect prescriptions or benefits on behalf of someone else or go shopping for the family

look after brothers or sisters, by taking them to school, doing their laundry, or cooking their meals

take care of housework, such as dusting, hoovering, washing or ironing

speak on behalf of someone who has difficulty speaking or communicating for

themselves

translate or interpret for someone at home

On many of our app reviews we recommend switching off location settings for your child. This is because having them turned on could show your child's location, or frequently visited places to lots of people – either to all their



contacts on a private profile, or to any user on a public profile.

But are there times that you might want to allow an app to have access to location settings?

Many apps and games give users the option to share their location. You should sit down with your child and review the location settings on their favourite app or game and talk to them about what they're sharing online. Remind them, and explain why, they should-n't share location on posts, or public forums and chats, videos or with people they don't know.

What apps allow you to share your location:

- Instagram
- Facebook
- Pokemon Go
- Snapchat
- and many more.

What are the risks of location sharing?

- If shared publicly, their location could be seen by someone they don't know.
- People could find out where they go to school or live.
- Allow accurate picture of movements / routine to be built up.

All of these things increase risk to children, of cyberbullying, stalking or unwanted contact (from friends or others) or becoming a target.
