## KEY SCHOOL EVENTS



#### YEAR 9-13 PARIS TRIP 2022

The vibrant magical light of Paris descended like a dove sparkling majestically on the sun-soaked lake. Whilst taking in the view we thought to ourselves this is Paris. This is France.

On the first day of our trip, the excitement was palpable, filling the coach with an atmosphere of anticipation and adventure. After having departed at 7:45am, we travelled to France by ferry which gave us the opportunity to relax and to get to know each other whilst enjoying looking at the White Cliffs of



Dover. We arrived at the accommodation at 6:30pm and took our bags to our room before enjoying a delicious steak meal. We then went for a relaxing walk to Ozoir la Ferrière, taking in the fine French culture and conversing with the locals.

After a restful sleep, we travelled by coach to Paris, firstly visiting the Sacré cur Basilica which provided a lovely view of the Paris skyline. We then visited the artist district before climbing the Eiffel Tower which was the highlight of the trip; despite waiting for a long time, it was worth the wait as we climbed the Iron lady (as it is known by Parisians) and we could not believe the view which greeted us. It was truly a moment you could never forget as we climbed the monument and the canvas of the city skyline blended beautifully with the fading light, forming a symphony of colour and structure. After that, we then returned for an evening of sports and fun.

On the third day of our amazing trip, we visited the Asterisk theme park. We all loved the thrilling rides and the attractions cooled us down on the hot day. The more daring amongst us braved the Eye of Iris which was a ride full of loops and sharp drops. We then proceeded to take a picnic in front of the Invalides which is a military hospital created to care for injured and elderly veterans of the French army. It is also the home of the tomb of Emperor Napoleon, one of the finest military leaders to walk the Earth. Soon after this we visited the quarter Latin, known for its amazing night life and for being a paragon of French culture and expression. Some of us danced along to the jazz music, whilst others practised their French skills by ordering in French from the nearby restaurants and cafes. Later, we took a tour of Paris by night giving us a new perspective on the monuments we had seen earlier that day. But the highlight for us all was when the clock struck midnight and the Eiffel Tower sparkled brightly providing a site to behold. We then returned to our accommodation at 1.30am to get some sleep.

On the Sunday, we walked again into the centre of Ozoir la Ferrière before attending an evangelical service full of song and music. We quickly travelled by coach to take a cruise on the River Seine which was incredible and we saw the sights of Paris, including the Notre Dame and the Eiffel Tower, as we gently glided down the river enjoying our lunch. We then visited Notre Dame briefly which was sadly damaged in a fire in 2019. We then visited the Centre de Pompidou which is an inside out art centre continent showcasing many fascinating art prices, such as works by Pablo Picasso. We the returned back to the accommodation where we celebrated the birthday of one of the students.

On Monday we travelled on the coach to the fly-view experience which was a virtual reality headstand that allowed us to explore the streets of Paris as well as some of the Wonders of the World. We then travelled back to Saint John Payne for 10:00pm, concluding a brilliant, once-in-a-lifetime experience.

Many thanks go to the extraordinary teachers and members of staff. Throughout the trip we all learnt about the delights of the French language and France's rich and fascinating culture. One of my favourite moments was on the Saturday evening when he drove us around Paris when it was all lit up, and at midnight we ended up by the Eiffel Tower where we got to see it sparkle!

Part of our great experience was also due to the people who we came across whilst there, who were, for the most part, very kind and understanding and sometimes quite funny! One example of such kindness was when we were all given French Bibles at church on Sunday morning.




